Aug. 16th

Montreal, Canada

Arrive in Montreal, where we will be greeted by Silversea Cruises and transported to our overnight accommodation.

Evening:

This evening, we will gather in the hotel bar for pre-dinner cocktails and canapés, providing an opportunity to meet fellow travellers and your Solo Cruise Company Concierge Host, who will be accompanying you throughout your journey.

Considering the possibility of long travels to reach Montreal, the rest of your evening is yours to enjoy at your leisure.

Aug. 17th

Montreal – Iqaluit

After breakfast today we will be transferred to the airport for our private charter flight to the Iqaluit, the northernmost city in Canada.

Iqaluit is the capital city of the Canadian territory of Nunavut. It sits on vast Baffin Island in Frobisher Bay. The island is known for its ice-capped mountains and tundra valleys. Near the city, Sylvia Grinnell Territorial Park is home to caribou and Arctic foxes. Qaummaarviit Territorial Park, on a tiny island near the city, contains archaeological remains of the ancient Thule people.

Formerly known as Frobisher Bay, the modern city of Iqaluit is rich with traditional Inuit culture. It is the home of many Inuit artists, filmmakers and musicians, plus there are arts and culture festivals staged in the spring and summer that bring artists here from across the territory.

Afternoon:

In the afternoon, take a leisurely stroll around "the city" (more akin to a large town) and explore the day-to-day life in this remote region of the far North of Canada. Make sure to visit the Iqaluit Museum, boasting a noteworthy collection of Inuit artefacts and an excellent array of Inuit art on consignment—all crafted by local artists and available for purchase.

Evening:

Tonight, we will relish dinner at Silversea's pre-cruise hotel.

Aug. 18th

Iqaluit, Canada – Pond Inlet, Canada

After breakfast today, we will be transferred to the airport for our private charter flight from Iqaluit to Pond Inlet, where we will embark on Silver Endeavour.

Pond Inlet is a small, predominantly Inuit community of around 2,000 residents in the Qikiqtaaluk Region of Nunavut, Canada, located on northern Baffin Island. To the Inuit the name of the place "is and always has been Mittimatalik."

Wildlife abounds in the Pond Inlet area. The region is home to caribou, polar bears, Arctic foxes, ermines, lemmings, and Arctic hares. The coastal waters have walrus, seals, beluga whales (white whale), and narwhals.

Aug. 19th

Cape Hay & Baylot Island, Canada

Today will be spent cruising the Cape Hay and Baylot Island environs. Additionally, you will have the opportunity to enjoy Zodiac excursions in the bay, offering a closer encounter with the local wildlife, guided by your expedition team.

Aug. 20th

Buchan Guls, Canada

Buchan Gulf is a deep, elongated gash carved by glaciers during the last Ice Age that cuts 22 miles into the eastern shores of Baffin Island. The most striking feature in the Gulf are impressive steep coastal cliffs and rock pinnacles. The cliffs are comprised of hard Precambrian metamorphic rock that rises as much as 2,000 feet from the sea. The conditions are perfect for nesting Northern Fulmars, and in fact, this area is one of the most important nesting sites for these birds in the world. European explorer William Baffin first ventured here in the 15th century to search for the Northwest Passage

Throughout the day there will be expeditions activities with the Silversea expedition team.

Aug. 21st

Day at Sea

Days at sea are the perfect opportunity to relax, unwind and catch up with what you've been meaning to do. So, whether that is going to the gym, visiting the spa, whale watching, catching up on your reading or simply spending the day watching the incredible scenery passing by, sea days are the perfect balance to busy days filled with expeditions activities.

Aug. 22nd

Auyuittuq National Park, Canada

Located at the heart of Nunavut, on Baffin Island's Cumberland Peninsula, Auyuittuq National Park offers you one of the most beautiful and striking landscapes in Canada. Large valleys and steep-walled fjords surrounded by a skyline of irregular peaks and massive glaciers, exactly how you would picture the Arctic.

Auyuittuq homes little vegetation, however, you can however spot some arctic wildlife species in these stunning and serene landscapes. Arctic foxes, caribou, lemmings, snow geese, ermines, but also polar bears and many bird species like peregrine falcons can be observed. Several cetacean's species frequent the surrounding waters of the island, narwhals, beluga whales and orcas being the most likely to be seen. The coasts of the island are a haven for many seabirds like the king eider or the little auk.

Established a national park in 1972, Auyuittuq holds an extremely important place in Canada's history due to its location. Many civilisations visited Auyuittuq since the first people settled during the Stone Age, noting the ideal conditions for whaling. Among them, Norse and English explorers but also the Inuit, a people that left his mark on the island and all the Nunavut region. Auyuittuq means "The Land That Never Melts" in Inuktitut, the national park's land being covered by the huge Penny Ice Glacier.

Aug. 23rd

Cape Dyer (Nunavut), Canada

Cape Dyer is a remote wilderness and lies at the southeast tip of Canada's vast Baffin Island. It is located north of the Arctic Circle in the Canadian territory of Nunavut. Terraced cliffs rise up out of the icy sea as you sail close to land and there is a smattering of the purest white snow-capped mountains in the distance.

Baffin Island is the largest island in Canada with a vast rugged landscape which measures 507,451 square kilometres (195,928 square miles). It is the fifth largest island in the world. If you're lucky you might just spot one of the Polar bears which populate the island. Other animals which roam these cold lands include Arctic foxes, Caribou and Arctic hares. Seals and walrus can be seen hauled-out or close to shore in the water.

Keep a look out for whales in the sea around Baffin Island, there are four species for eagle eyed nature watchers to spot - Narwhals, Orca, Beluga and Bowhead.

Aug. 24th

Pangnirtung & Kerkerten Island (Nunavut), Canada

Morning:

Pangnirtung is an Inuit hamlet, in the Qikiqtaaluk Region of the Canadian territory of Nunavut, located on Baffin Island. The community is located about 45 km south of the Arctic Circle, and about 2,700 km from the North Pole

This morning, we will undertake a Town walk as well as a visit to the local Inuit Museum.

Afternoon:

The uninhabited Kerkerten Island is to be found in the Cumberland Sound off Baffin Island's Cumberland Peninsula. It is in the Qikiqtaaluk Region of Nunavut, Canada and part of the Canadian Arctic Archipelago. This is the site of a former whaling station, which operating between 1840 and 1923 and is now a National Historic Site of Canada.

The island is a fascinating open-air museum that still contains many remains from the whaling era, such as large cast iron pots used to render down the whale fat into oil, barrels to transport the oil, whalers burial grounds, ship parts etc. When the bowhead whale stocks disappeared, beluga whales and seals were harvested.

The last years of existence saw the island used as a trading post before it was abandoned in favour of the nearby community of Pangnirtung.

Aug. 25th

Monumental & Lady Franklin Islands, Canada

Morning:

Monumental Island is a splinter of ancient metamorphic rock, hunching in the frigid waters of the Davis Strait, defying the ocean and ice around it. Named to honour the legendary Polar Explorer Sir John Franklin, the island displays everything Nunavut has to offer, in an ocean studded with vast icebergs drifting across from Greenland. Monumental Island is a well-known den site for polar bears, the icon of the Arctic; there is a good chance to see mother bears with cubs on the island, as the bears become trapped by the lack of summer ice, using the island as a base to hunt until the ice returns in the Autumn. Seeing the white silhouette of a polar bear against the ancient black rock and autumn tundra colours is an experience that will remain long after returning on board.

Groups of harp seals are a common sight in the waters around Monumental Island, and can be very curious, often swimming very close to investigate new objects such as boats. There are several sites on the island also used as haul out sites for the charismatic Atlantic Walrus. These vast animals are surprisingly gentle and skittish and can often be observed caring for their calves on the rock bluffs while keeping a careful watch for polar bears.

Almost nowhere else in Nunavut can the charismatic wildlife of the Arctic be observed in such a stunning setting.

Afternoon:

Named in honour of Sir John Franklin's widow, the lonely and uninhabited Lady Franklin Island lies off Baffin Island's Hall Peninsula, at the entrance to Cumberland Sound. The island is named for the wife of Sir John Franklin, the Arctic explorer who died trying to discover the Northwest Passage.

The geology of the island is striking with vertical cliffs of Archean rocks, likely to be some of the oldest stone in Canada.

The waters around Lady Franklin Island offer an abundance seabirds, ducks, seals, and walrus. With a bit of luck it is possible to see Atlantic Puffins here and perhaps even a rare Sabine's Gull.

Aug. 26th

Lower Savage Islands, Canada

The Lower Savage Islands are a small group of islands off of the southeastern tip of Baffin Island, and a common location for polar bears to be found during the summer months. With plenty of land to roam while giving each other a wide berth as well as opportunities to feed, it seems that bears can be found here as the ice vanishes with the summer season's warming temperatures.

Aug. 27th

Day at Sea

Days at sea are the perfect opportunity to relax, unwind and catch up with what you've been meaning to do. So, whether that is going to the gym, visiting the spa, whale watching, catching up on your reading or simply spending the day watching the incredible scenery passing by, sea days are the perfect balance to busy days filled with expeditions activities.

Aug. 28th

Nuuk, Greenland

In the bustling capital city of Greenland, you could be forgiven for forgetting you are in such a vast and isolated country. Nuuk is Greenland's economic and social hub, home to more than a third of Greenland's population, and although it feels like a world capital, scratch the surface and a uniquely Greenlandic character can be found underneath.

Nuuk Cathedral overlooks the gorgeous old Colonial Harbour district and the Greenland National Museum, resting place of the legendary Qilakitsoq mummies, the true highlight of the museum's archaeological collection.

Above the Colonial Harbour sits downtown Nuuk, with lines of Scandi-style apartments, a bustling shopping district, the Greenlandic Parliament, Nuuk City Hall (which welcomes visitors to see its artwork) and even outdoor cafes selling locally produced food and beer. These nods to modernity compete for space with local artisan boutiques, the meat market selling the catch from Nuuk's vast fjord-lands, and the stunning Katuaq Cultural Centre, where blockbuster movies, as well as local and foreign performers entertain the people of Nuuk.

Although Nuuk has long been a melting pot of Danish and Greenlandic ideas, this is a city where Greenland displays its sophistication, with the Country's only traffic lights, roundabouts and University. Most of all, expect to find a multitude of friendly people who are proud of who they are, and equally proud of the city they call home.

Aug. 29th

Hvalsey, Greenland

18 kilometres northeast of Qaqortoq, Hvalsey is part of Qaqortukuloq, one of the five sites of the UNESCO World Heritage Arctic farming complex Kujataa. Between Eriksfjord to the north and Einarsfjord to the south, the Hvalseyfjord branches off from Einarsfjord.

Although Hvalsey is better known for the well-preserved ruins of one of the sixteen churches in the Norse's Eastern Settlement, the church was in a farmstead known as Thjodhild's Stead. This farmstead at the north-eastern end of the fjord included a large building with living quarters, a hall and livestock pens, as well as a storage building and a warehouse –the ruins of which can still be seen.

The Norse farming laid the foundation for the Inuit farming in later centuries, leading to the UNESCO World Heritage status in 2017. In the 14th century account "Descriptions of Greenland" the abundant fish, a reindeer farm on Reindeer Island and Hvalsey's name "Whale Island" clearly indicate that the Norse had ample food sources at that time. The church was built in the Anglo-Norwegian style of the 13th century but is known to have been built over an older graveyard. The farmstead is mentioned in the Icelandic "Book of Settlements" as property of the Kings of Norway, and the last documented event of the Norse in Greenland is a wedding which took place in the church in September 1408.

After almost 600 years of abandonment, conservation work had to be done to prevent the seaward wall from collapsing.

Aug. 30th

Qaqortoq & Uunartoq Island, Greenland

Morning:

The largest town in southern Greenland, Qaqortoq has been inhabited since prehistoric times. Upon arrival in this charming southern Greenland enclave, it's easy to see why. Qaqortoq rises quite steeply over the fjord system around the city, offering breath-taking panoramic vistas of the surrounding mountains, deep, blue sea, Lake Tasersuag, icebergs in the bay, and pastoral backcountry.

Although the earliest signs of ancient civilisation in Qaqortoq date back 4,300 years, Qaqortoq is known to have been inhabited by Norse and Inuit settlers in the 10th and 12th centuries. The present-day town was founded in 1774.

In the years since, Qaqortoq has evolved into a seaport and trading hub for fish and shrimp processing, tanning, fur production, and ship maintenance and repair.

Afternoon:

In the local Kalaallisut language, Uunartoq means 'hot', and there is no mystery why. Several warm springs exist in Greenland, but Uunartoq Island is the only site where the waters form a pool warm enough to bathe in. Although not as well-known as the famous springs of Iceland, nowhere can challenge Uunartoq for scenery.

The picturesque series of steaming pools are backed by some of the best scenery Greenland has to offer. Icebergs larger than city blocks drift through the labyrinth of fjords which make up Southern Greenland, passing as they drift towards the ocean. Mountains pierce the clouds, and the tundra blooms in the long summer days. And there is no better way to appreciate the spectacular wilderness of South Greenland than from the perfectly warmed natural comfort of the Uunartoq hot spring.

The ancient crystalline rock of Southern Greenland is nearly two billion years old. A fault in the rock allows water to sink down into the ground, where Earth's internal heat warms it, causing it to rise again. Uunartoq Island is the site where this water escapes, forming a sandy pool heated constantly from below.

Basic changing facilities and a grass walkway to the stone-lined pool allow visitors comfort, while reconnecting with nature. It is believed that the Norse settlers in Greenland knew of and made use of the pool, but the island has never been inhabited, excluding a few summerhouses belonging to local residents.

Aug. 31st

Aappilattoq Island and Prince Christian Sound, Greenland

Morning:

If you're looking for remote and remarkable then look no further. Cruise through Prince Christian Sound to the western end and you'll find Aapilattoq, a (very) small Greenlandic village of just 100 inhabitants. The name of the village means "sea anemone" in the local Greenlandic language, and the fact that the village has retained its Inuit name is a good indication of what you can expect; traditional village life much as it has been for the past 100 years.

Hunting and fishing are the main occupations here, and it is not unusual when taking a stroll through Aappilattoq, past the small school (where 22 pupils from ages 3-16 are enrolled) and church, to come across a polar bear skin drying in the wind behind a local dwelling.

The village is hidden behind a prominent red rock and towering mountains, which make the village virtually inaccessible by land. Naturally, the Aapilattoq and its surrounding area are phenomenally rich in Arctic wildlife: Arctic fox and Arctic hare live in the countryside around the village while marine mammals include ringed seal, harbour seal, hooded seal, bearded seal, harp seal, humpback whale (typically in summer), minke whale, fin whale, narwhal, and beluga.

Afternoon:

The transit through the Sound is one of this voyage's highlights. Connecting the Labrador Sea with the Irminger Sea, Prince Christian Sound or "Prins Christian Sund" in Danish is named after Prince (later King) Christian VII (1749-1808). 100 km (60-miles), long and at times just 500 m (1500 ft) wide, this majestic and spectacular fiord throws you back into a Viking era – flanked by soaring snow-topped mountains, rock-strewn cliffs and rolling hills, it is as if time has stood still and one easily forgets that this is the 21st century.

As you marvel at the sheer size of the mountains that surround you, with the Arctic waters lapping deceptively at the hull, revel in the silence enveloping you. Icebergs float serenely by, carrying with them the ages of time. Be sure to wear warm clothing as this is one spectacle that you do not want to miss.

Sept. 1st

Skjoldungen, Greenland

Located on Greenland's relatively rarely visited rugged east coast, Skjoldungen Fjord has enchanting scenery with towering mountains tipped with snow, ice-scraped valley sides and sculptured icebergs in shades of white and blue. At the top of the fjord one can easily see the retreating state of the Thrym Glacier.

The U-shaped fjord offers spectacular scenery and as an extra perk, it is not uncommon to see whales in the fjord.

Sept. 2nd

Day at Sea

Days at sea are the perfect opportunity to relax, unwind and catch up with what you've been meaning to do. So whether that is going to the gym, visiting the spa, whale watching, catching up on your reading or simply spending the day watching the incredible scenery passing by, sea days are the perfect balance to busy days filled with expeditions activities.

Sept. 3rd

Skjoldungen, Greenland

Morning:

Upon disembarkation in Iceland, please collect your luggage, where you'll be met by our private driver from Nordic Luxury in the arrival hall. Subsequently, you will be transferred to the [Iceland Parliament Hotel](#). Your Concierge Host will be available to assist you at all times during your arrival. Please ensure you keep your swimwear, sunglasses, etc., in a separate small bag, as we have a surprise for you!

Unwind in a steamy oasis just minutes outside of downtown Reykjavik that will transport you between the expansive North Atlantic Ocean and the nurturing waters of a geothermal lagoon. Sky Lagoon's magnificent infinity-style pool allows you to feel immersed in the sea with its impressive illusion, wrapping you in a mist of comforting steam while the glazed surface of the Atlantic extends out in front of you.

The lagoon also takes inspiration from elements of Viking architecture, such as the rugged lava rock interior that mimics the Icelandic landscape, the authentic turf wall on the exterior of the building, and the turf shelter encompassing the spa. The spa offers you the opportunity to indulge in the seven-step ritual, featuring a wet sauna, cold fog mist, and body scrub, among other rejuvenating features, as well as a spacious dry sauna with a floor-to-ceiling window view of the ocean scenery. If you really want to invigorate your senses, take a dip in the adjacent cold plunge pool – a centuries-old Icelandic tradition to finish off the experience.

Afternoon:

This afternoon, we'll be joined by a Reykjavik food guide who will introduce us to Icelandic cuisine. Icelandic food has developed from simple beginnings to modern ingenuity, still infusing many of the same ingredients while creating new and enticing flavour profiles. Traditional cuisine has always involved a diet of meat and fish, but while the people's palates have transformed, so have many dishes. Not only can you find meat-centred meals at local restaurants, but a range of vegan/vegetarian options, too!

On our food walk around Reykjavik, you'll discover Icelandic cuisine at its very best as you taste elements of history and future in an exciting selection of bites! You'll be sampling so many exquisite dishes; it'll be more than enough to leave you satisfied once your food adventure concludes. Savor some of the freshest recipes you can find in the capital and learn how Icelanders have made their food the finest of the Nordic countries.

Sept. 4th

Golden Circle, Geothermal Bakery & Frioheimar, Iceland

After breakfast and checking out of the hotel, we embark on Iceland's famed Golden Circle tour.

The Golden Circle is a premier sightseeing adventure in Iceland, showcasing three iconic landmarks that epitomise the country's natural beauty. Thingvellir National Park, Gullfoss Waterfall, and the mighty Geysir combine to offer an unforgettable journey through Iceland's breathtaking landscapes.

Our first stop is Thingvellir National Park, the only national park in Iceland to hold UNESCO World Heritage Status. Situated between the North American and Eurasian tectonic plates, this park features remarkable geological formations, including lava rocks, volcanoes, and the country's largest lake, Thingvallavatn. Notably, it also holds historical significance as the site of Iceland's first parliament, established in 930 A.D.

Next, we visit Geysir, a renowned geothermal area famous for its impressive hot springs. While the Great Geysir itself has been dormant for nearly a century, its neighbour, Strokkur, erupts approximately every ten minutes, shooting water up to 20-40 meters into the air.

We then experience Iceland's unique geothermal baking tradition at a local bakery. Witness how traditional Icelandic rye bread is made using natural geothermal heat, resulting in a warm and fluffy delicacy served with authentic Icelandic accompaniments.

Our final stop on the Golden Circle is Gullfoss Waterfall, a majestic cascade plunging into an ancient valley. Fed by the Hvíta River, originating from the Langjökull glacier, this powerful waterfall showcases nature's grandeur, particularly during the summer months when its flow is most intense. Admire the breathtaking scenery, often enhanced by the appearance of rainbows shimmering in the mist.

Afterward, we visit Friðheimar farm, renowned for its sustainable organic produce, particularly juicy tomatoes grown year-round in their greenhouses. Founded by spouses Knútur Rafn Ármann and Helena Hermundardóttir, this family-run restaurant utilises Iceland's geothermal energy to cultivate fresh produce despite the country's challenging climate. Dine inside the greenhouse amidst thriving plants, enjoying an unparalleled culinary experience with exceptionally fresh and flavourful dishes.

Evening:

Dinner at the hotel (payable locally) & overnight at Hotel Geysir or similar.

Sept. 5th

Thorsmork Super Jeep Adventure, Iceland

After breakfast we'll check out of the hotel and head off for a day of spectacular Icelandic sightseeing.

Thorsmork is home to some of the most diverse and versatile trails in Iceland, allowing you to explore short and scenic paths, as well as more challenging and detailed ones. Here, all the most breathtaking natural wonders come together to form unrivalled views of the landscape. Mountains, volcanoes, glaciers, and sweeping valleys make up just some of the amazing features found in this area.

Sept. 6th

South Coast & Katla Ice Cave

Today, you'll explore Iceland's most scenic region: the south coast. This breathtaking stretch of land showcases some of the country's youngest geological formations, many of which emerged during the last Ice Age. A full-day excursion awaits, offering a glimpse into the wonders of Icelandic nature. Along the journey, you'll visit the renowned Seljalandsfoss and Skógafoss waterfalls, each with its own mesmerising charm. Immerse yourself in the enchanting landscapes of volcanoes, glaciers, and mountains, transporting you to a world straight out of a fairy tale.

Venture into the otherworldly realm near the base of the Katla volcano, where a landscape of volcanic sand and remarkable natural wonders awaits. Amidst this surreal backdrop of volcanic debris and moss-covered mountainsides lie extraordinary ice caves, nestled atop a vast glacier amidst the rugged terrain. These two elements of nature coexist in striking contrast to one another.

The ice caves offer a magical glimpse into the intricate beauty of glacial movements, forming captivating caverns of transparent ice adorned with vibrant blues and streaks of black ash. Crystal-like formations adorn every surface, frozen in an array of shapes and patterns, creating a pristine universe amidst the rugged volcanic landscape. With new caves forming each year, the possibilities of what you'll encounter inside are endless.

Sept. 7th

South Coast & Katla Ice Cave

After breakfast we'll check out of the hotel and head off for a once in a lifetime opportunity- we'll be descending into a dormant volcano!

Iceland is one of the most volcanically active destinations in the world, mostly due to its location on the Mid-Atlantic Ridge. In the centre of the ridge stands this immovable volcano known as Thríhnúkagígur, roughly translating to Three Peaks Crater, and its presence here brings travellers to Iceland a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity.

Here, you'll descend into a vast and vibrant magma chamber of an Icelandic volcano that has remained inactive for over 4,000 years.

This journey will see you lowered into the opening with a specially designed and secure lift. As your descent begins, the magma chamber and its beauty become instantly apparent, displaying a range of colorations and bizarre textures.

Expect to see rough walls and intricate formations splattered in yellows, blues, violets, and oranges; so vibrant, that their hue creates a different universe entirely. Once you reach the bottom, the sheer power of this titanic natural force becomes overwhelming, and suddenly its vastness swallows you in wonderment.

Afternoon:

We'll travel back to Reykjavik and arrive early afternoon where we will return to the Iceland Parliament Hotel. The remainder of your day is it leisure for you to return to the town centre for some of excellent shopping or perhaps a coffee at the famous Mokka Kaffi café, made famous by the American singer & songwriter (and Icelandic citizen), John Grant.

Evening:

Having spent the most amazing 21-days together, we can't let you leave without celebrating our incredible travels through the Canadian Arctic, Greenland and Iceland. So, we have a very beautiful "farewell dinner" planned for you this evening which is a celebration of the very best cuisine and culinary talent in Iceland.

Sept. 8th

Departure flights to your home city

After breakfast this morning we will begin our transfers by private car or van to the airport to coincide with your departure flights throughout the day.
